



# A visual guide to vaccines

## used in the routine immunisation schedule

Vaccine trade name/abbreviation	Disease(s) protected against	Age due
<b>Infanrix hexa</b> DTaP/IPV/Hib/HepB	Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), polio, <i>Haemophilus influenzae</i> type b (Hib) and hepatitis B	8, 12, 16 weeks
<b>Prevenar 13</b> PCV	Pneumococcal (13 serotypes)	12 weeks and 1 year
<b>Bexsero</b> MenB	Meningococcal group B	8, 16 weeks and 1 year
<b>Rotarix</b> Rotavirus (oral)	Rotavirus gastroenteritis	8 and 12 weeks
<b>Menitorix</b> Hib/MenC	<i>Haemophilus influenzae</i> type b (Hib) and meningococcal group C	1 year
<b>M-M-RvaxPro or Priorix</b> MMR	Measles, mumps and rubella	1 year and 3 years 4 months
<b>Fluenz Tetra</b> LAIV (nasal)	Influenza	Eligible paediatric age groups*
<b>Repevax</b> dTaP/IPV	Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio	3 years 4 months and pregnant women from 16 weeks gestation
<b>Gardasil</b> HPV	Cancers caused by human papillomavirus (HPV) types 16 and 18 (and genital warts types 6 and 11)	Boys and girls aged 12 to 13 years (school year 8)
<b>Revaxis</b> Td/IPV	Tetanus, diphtheria and polio	14 years (school year 9)
<b>Nimenrix</b> MenACWY	Meningococcal groups A, C, W and Y	14 years (school year 9)
<b>Boostrix-IPV or Repevax</b> dTaP/IPV	Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio	Pregnant women from 16 weeks gestation
<b>Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine PPV</b>	Pneumococcal (23 serotypes)	65 years
<b>Zostavax</b> Shingles	Shingles	70 years
